Curriculum Map

Asian Studies previously did not have a curriculum map, and the following is a preliminary version compiled by ANST faculty in Fall 2023 based on PLO A, B, and C. The ongoing nature of this map is attributed to various factors, primarily tied to the flexible, multidisciplinary structure of our major/minor. This structure involves drawing courses from a broad spectrum of Asia-related disciplines across different departments and programs.

Some unevaluated courses (such as HIST 130 and most YPSP courses), are currently taught by adjunct faculty after the departure or retirement of full-time faculty. Other unevaluated courses (e.g., POLS 369, 347, and MUS 211) are offered intermittently and possibly by adjunct faculty. We are actively working to engage with related programs and faculty to gather updated data and address these gaps.

The process of mapping out the curriculum has also highlighted courses that are no longer available due to recent retirements (e.g., HIST 384, 386, 387, as well as some THRS courses). We plan to discuss potential revisions to the map in our next faculty meeting in Spring 2024, aiming to address these gaps and ensure a more comprehensive and up-to-date curriculum.

The ANST program is a very small one, with an average of 6-8 majors at a time in recent years (the Fall of 2023 retains a total of 14 majors). Hence, the program elected to conduct assessment over a 3-year period. While the number of ANST Minors is relatively larger than that of the Majors, with 26 as of Fall 2023, students choose from a wide range (40+) of ANST courses to fulfill their requirements. It has been quite challenging to collect data to assess our ANST Minors for several reasons. Up to Fall 2020, there was no course required for the Minor, and as such, the most promising courses to draw on would be the gateway courses. However, each gateway course has multiple sections any given semester, taught by a variety of instructors, and therefore it is challenging to ascertain when our majors are taking the gateway courses and from which instructors, which in turn makes it difficult to ask the professors to share the student papers for assessment.

With the most recent curriculum change that went into effect in 2020, all ANST majors and minors are required to take Pro-seminar ANST 300, which was offered for the first time in Spring 2021 and then again in Spring 2023. Work from this class was used for the assessment of both majors and minors in the Fall 2021 assessment. We have collected student works from this class in Spring 2023 to assess PLO C in the Fall 2024 assessment, per feedback received in May 2023.

ANST faculty will meet in Spring 2024 to discuss following issues related to this assessment report:

- 1. Revise the initial Curriculum Map by eliminating courses that are no longer taught and incorporating regularly offered new courses.
- 2. Address the irregular teaching of courses, especially Gateway courses, and explore potential solutions.
- 3. Explore the challenge surrounding the Capstone seminar: historically offered through the MA in Asia Pacific Studies (MAPS) collaboration, assess its viability following the consolidation of MAPS into MAIS. If deemed unviable, explore alternative options.
- 4. Consider adding PLO D, which only applies to ANST majors, to the curriculum map
- 5. Place a plan to gather student works from ANST 300 in Fall 2024 to support the assessment of Program Learning Outcome D (PLO D), with a tentative assessment scheduled for Fall 2027.
- 6. Discuss the next phase of assessment plan and whether there is a need to revise PLOs. As of now, the tentative plan is to provide an assessment report on PLO B in Fall 2027.
