The ANST program is a very small one, with an average of only 6-8 majors at a time in recent years (the Fall of 2022 saw an increase to about 15, reflecting this year's robust Fall enrollment). Hence, the program elected to conduct assessment over a 3-year period. While the number of ANST Minors is relatively larger than that of the Majors, with about 25 as of Fall 2021 and 26 as of Fall 2022, students choose from a wide range (40+) of ANST courses to fulfill their requirements. It has been quite challenging to collect data to assess our ANST Minors for several reasons. Up to Fall 2020, there was no course required for the Minor, and as such, the most promising courses to draw on would be the gateway courses. However, each gateway course has multiple sections any given semester, taught by a variety of instructors, and therefore it is challenging to ascertain when our majors are taking the gateway courses and from which instructors, which in turn makes it difficult to ask the professors to share the student papers for assessment.

With the most recent curriculum change that went into effect in 2020, all ANST majors and minors are required to take Pro-seminar ANST 300, which was offered for the first time in Spring 2021 (and will be offered again in Spring 2023). Work from this class was used for the assessment of both majors and minors in the Fall 2021 assessment. We plan to continue to collect student works from this class to assess PLO C in the next assessment, per feedback received in April 2022.
