Red Flowering Gum



This gum tree is very favored among city planners, as its endemic status makes it easier to grow in this area, and the bright red flowers are visually stunning on any sidewalk.

Bird's Eye



These beautiful, resilient flowers can be found sprinkled throughout the city. They prefer full to partial sun and sandy soils, making them perfect for San Francisco.

Yarrow



These flowers come in many colors, including shades of pink, white, red, and yellow. Blooming from March to November, they are beautiful, easy to grow, and pollinator-friendly!

Coastal California Poppy



Commonly confused with the solid orange non-native California Poppy, this bright yellow flower can be found throughout the city, favoring coastal areas.

Coastal Redwoods



Redwood trees are an iconic feature of California's ecology. These giants can live up to 2,000 years and can grow over 200 feet, making them the tallest trees in the world!

Monterey Cypress



These beautiful trees have a fairly small native range; this tree, of the cypress family, only grows along the California Central Coast. While this tree is rare or invasive in other regions, San Francisco is lucky to have these thriving all over city parks!

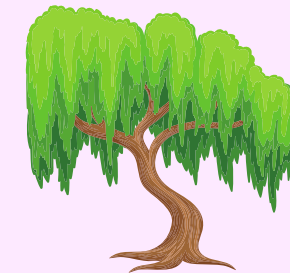
