- 6. Who do you consider your supporters to be (friends, family, significant others)? How are they supporting you during law school? How would you like them to support you during law school?
- 7. Who is the one person in your life you're working to get your bar card for, other than yourself (e.g., a parent, sibling, spouse, significant other)?

- 9. What did you study in undergrad? Are you coming straight through from undergrad? Why did you come straight through? If not, how long has it been since you graduated? Why did you wait?

- 12. What are your strengths when it comes to the skills needed to be successful <u>in your classes</u> / the bar exam (study skills, analytical skills, reading comprehension skills, writing skills)?

- 13. What are your areas for growth when it comes to the skills needed to be successful <u>in your classes / the bar exam</u> (study skills, analytical skills, reading comprehension skills, writing skills)?
- 14. What's the best thing about you? In other words, what's your best quality? It does not need to be law school-related at all.
