## Enrollment and Retention

Our recruitment efforts this year focus on expanding our reach, strengthening our market position to increase selectivity, communicating the ROI of a USF education, and optimizing recruitment and marketing strategies. We are using an integrated, comprehensive approach that focuses on enhancing lead generation, recruiting first-year, transfer and international students, and enrollment initiatives for graduate programs.

As you may have read in **the census email** earlier this month, our undergraduate first-year retention, second-year retention, and graduation rates have decreased. Our institutional and survey data suggest that the main factors influencing retention rates were financial issues, academic performance, homesickness, and feelings of lack of connectedness and belonging.

The Student Success, Retention and Equity Task Force (SSRE) is implementing a multipronged approach to improve retention and four- and six-year graduation rates, combining enrollment strategies, academic projects, and belonging, wellness and equity initiatives. Examples of retention and persistence initiatives include examining high-risk populations to determine whether they require additional support, leveraging summer sessions to support students in staying on track toward graduation, expanding first-year introductory USF courses that help students connect to the university, developing a targeted retention and belonging initiative for Latinx students, adding an internship course for international students, and providing additional support for internship and practicum opportunities for all students to strengthen college-to-career connections and outcomes.

## Strategic Planning

I am working closely with the **Strategic Plan Advisory Council**, to create a dashboard of key implementation priorities, ensuring we include key stakeholders and KPIs (or relevant ways to gauge our progress). We look forward to implementing as many of the working group recommendations as possible this year and posting the dashboard to the **strategic plan web page** shortly.

The goals of this program are to build faculty capacity for community-engaged teaching and research, strengthen the culture of community engagement across USF, and

ensure that the exemplary work of USF faculty shapes the broader field of higher

education community engagement.

Awards and Accomplishments

Our recent U.S. News & World Report rankings reflect our mission to deliver an excellent education that serves as an engine of social mobility, provides value, and

draws global talent as diverse as any institution in the nation.

The restructured **Office of Sponsored Programs** (formerly Office of Contracts and Grants) is facilitating both faculty-driven and institutional grant activity, with more than \$5M in institutional grants awarded since June.

In partnership with librarians and administrators from Loyola Marymount University, Santa Clara University, and Saint Mary's College of California, **Gleeson Library** and our partners were collectively awarded over \$1.5 million for a U.S. Department of Education Open Textbooks Pilot Program Grant to empower faculty to create Open Educational Resources over the next three years.

Serving Institutions (**AANAPISI**) grant, *Building Institutional Capacity through an Integrated AAPI Center for Educational Success*, from the Department of Education. The total award is \$1,412,561 from 2023-2027.
